WHEREAS, native plants are indigenous species that have evolved alongside native wildlife and

occur naturally in a particular geographic region, ecosystem, and habitat; and

WHEREAS. native plants are essential for healthy, diverse, and sustainable ecosystems and are

critical for cleaning air, filtering water, and stabilizing soils; and

WHEREAS, native plants are well-adapted to Vermont's soils, temperatures, precipitation, and

environmental conditions, making them the best option for conserving and protecting

our environment, and adapting to its changes; and

WHEREAS, native plants provide food including nectar, pollen, seeds, and foliage for native

birds, caterpillars, butterflies, bees and other wildlife in ways that non-native plants

often do not; and

WHEREAS, Vermont supports plants that are federally listed under the Endangered Species Act

of 1973, such as small whorled pogonia (Isotria medeoloides) and Jesup's milk-vetch (Astrgalus robbinsii var jesupii) and Vermont currently has 164 state threatened and endangered plants, including butterfly-weed (Asclepias tuberosa), Dwarf Birch (Betula minor), Marsh Horsetail (Equisetum palustre), and Fulvous Peatmoss

(Sphagnum subfulvum); and

WHEREAS, it is important to encourage public awareness about the benefits of Vermont native

plants to pollinators and other wildlife, to the economy, and to the health and

sustainability of Vermont's fragile ecosystems; and

WHEREAS, Vermonters can observe Native Plant Month by removing non-native invasive plants

in yards and communities, by planting native trees, shrubs and flowers, and by

educating Vermonters about the many benefits of native plants.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Philip B. Scott, Governor, hereby proclaim May 2024 as

NATIVE PLANT MONTH

in Vermont.
